

# Norman's on the long road to London

An artist from Preston is preparing for his first solo show in the capital. He spoke to Barbara Waite

ancashire artist Norman
Long has a spring in his step
this month with the opening
of his first solo show in a
prestigious London gallery.

For the last 17 months he has been working on more than 40 works from his studio in Preston for this major boost to his career at the Osborne Studio Gallery in Knightsbridge just around the corner from Harrods.

Since graduating from university in Newcastle and spending a year as artist in residence at King Edward and Queen Mary School near St Annes, commissions have come in from all over England and - thanks to a one-year stint studying and working as a teaching assistant in a Philadelphia art school - America too.

Traditionally it can take many years to get this sort of London exposure, but Norman entered and won an art magazine competition and the prize was a solo exhibition in the capital.

'I've had paintings in London





exhibitions before, but it can take years and years slowly building up a reputation before you get a solo show, so this is a fantastic opportunity for me,' said Norman. 'The relationship between gallery owner and artist can be tricky, but it has worked really well. They've been up to Preston to visit my freezing studio and have been

very encouraging. I've been given free rein on what I paint and it's been a great learning experience putting together a collection of paintings,' he added.

People expect pictures of local scenes to be of a recognisable building or landmark but in Norman's work the location is secondary to colour and light, atmosphere and composition. He connects with the subject in ways which make you linger over a painting. Prices start at about £500.

# Until September WithDraw, Imperial War Museum North, Salford

Depicting everyday life in Afghanistan, a new display of artworks drawn live in situ by journalist and reportage illustrator George Butler will be unveiled for the first time.

The images were specially created for this small, powerful display. Butler's previous work has appeared in news media outlets and exhibitions across the globe but these new images offer an insight into what happens away from the TV cameras, at quiet moments in between the events that make news headlines.
